If you arrive late, please observe this social distance zone, and if you are sitting in these pews, please keep at least a metre away from the next person.

If you do not wish to sit distanced, then the Piccadilly side (the left-hand side as you come in) is free seating, both at ground floor and gallery level.

As we continue to evolve our arrangements, please be sensitive to those around you and please also don't hesitate to move to a distance if you are feeling uncomfortable.

We are fortunate to have a large airy building and we hope that you will feel comfortable as we pray our way through these days.

OPENING HYMN

The prophets' voice comes down the years to teach and to inspire,

OPENING RESPONSES

The priest says

Grace, mercy and peace from God and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

And also with you.

The priest introduces the service.

All say

Eternal God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts

by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

PRAYER OF RECONCILIATION

The deacon says

God of miracle and wonder for whom nothing is impossible, you long to reveal yourself to us that we might reach out to you and know ourselves to be your own, cherished and chosen.

In silence we pause before you to confess our need for forgiveness and grace.

Silence is kept.

Forgive us if we have been too preoccupied or distracted to notice the extraordinary in the ordinary.

The cantor sings

Kyrie eleison, eleison. Kyrie eleison, eleison. (Lord, have mercy.)

The deacon says

Forgive us if we have failed to recognize you in the faces of both friends and strangers.

The cantor sings

Christe eleison, eleison. Christe eleison, eleison. (Christ, have mercy.)

The deacon says

Forgive us if we have let the sound of our own voices drown out your call.

The cantor sings

Kyrie eleison, eleison. **Kyrie eleison, eleison.**

THE ABSOLUTION

The priest says

May the God of mercy and truth forgive

you and set you free. May you take God's forgiveness to heart and be at peace. **Amen.**

THE GLORIA (Taizé)

The cantor sings first then we sing once together and then twice as a 4-part round.

Gloria, Gloria in excelsis Deo. Gloria, Gloria. Alleluia, alleluia. (Glory to God in the highest. Alleluia.)

LITURGY OF THE WORD The Collect

The priest says

Let us pray.

Eternal God, who at the baptism of Jesus revealed him to be your Son, anointing him with the Holy Spirit:

grant to us, who are born again by water and the Spirit, that we may be faithful to our calling as your adopted children; through Jesus Christ.

Amen.

Please sit.

FIRST READING Acts 8.14-17

Now when the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. The two went down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit (for as yet the Spirit had not come upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus). Then Peter and John laid their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

Listen for what the Spirit is saying. **Thanks be to God.**

Please stand.

PSALM 29

Response: You give your people the blessing of peace.

Ascribe to God you heavenly powers: ascribe to God all glory and might.
Ascribe due honour to God's holy name: worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness.

The voice of the Lord is upon the waters: it is the glorious God who makes the thunder upon the great waters.

The voice of God is power: the voice of God is full of majesty.

The voice of God breaks the cedar-trees: the Lord splinters the cedars of Lebanon. The voice of God divides the lightning: the voice of the Lord shakes the wilderness, God shakes the wilderness of Kadesh.

God sits enthroned above the waters: God sits enthroned as King for ever. You, Lord, will give strength to your people: you will give your people the blessing of peace.

Please remain standing.

THE GOSPEL Luke 3.15-17, 21-22

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Glory to you O Lord.

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, 'I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you O Christ.**

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

The priest continues the Church's prayer of thanksgiving ...

SANCTUS AND BENEDICTUS (Williams)

Sing each phrase after the cantor

Holy, holy, holy Lord.
God of power and might,
Heaven and earth are full of your glory,
Hosanna,
Hosanna in the highest.

The cantor sings

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.

Sing after the cantor

Hosanna, Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest.

The prayer of consecration continues recalling Christ's command to his disciples at the Last Supper, ending with: "... as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me"

The cantor sings

Great is the mystery of faith.

Sing after the cantor

Christ has died.

Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The prayer continues. At the end of the prayer, sing after the cantor . . .

Blessing and honour, glory and power, be yours forever and ever. Amen.

Silence is kept.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

You are invited to pray in your own language.

The priest says

Rejoicing in the presence of God here among us, let us pray in the words that Jesus gave us.

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come, your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation
but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the
glory are yours, now and for ever.
Amen.

The Bread is broken and the priest says
We break the bread of life,
and that life is the light of the world.

God here among us, light in the midst of us, bring us light and life.

Christ is the true bread come from heaven. The body of Christ keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

THE COMMUNION

During Communion, the Lay Singers and Scholars will sing **A New Year Carol**, words by Walter de la Mare (1873-1956) and music by Benjamin Britten (1913-1976) Here we bring new water from the well so clear.

For to worship God with, this happy New Year.

Sing levy dew, sing levy dew, the water and the wine;

The seven bright gold wires and the bugles that do shine.

Sing reign of Fair Maid, with gold upon her toe.

Open you the West Door, and turn the Old Year go.

Sing reign of Fair Maid, with gold upon her chin,

Open you the East Door, and let the New Year in.
