Night:

Light of the world,
enter into the depths of our lives.
Come into the dark and hidden places.
Walk into the storehouse of our
memories.
Hear the hidden secrets of the past.
Plumb the very depths of our being.
Be present through the silent hours,
and bring us safely to your glorious
light.
Amen.
