We've also recently spotted Hairy-footed Flower bees and kleptoparasitic 'cuckoo' bees who hang about at the entrance to Andrena bee nests waiting for them to be temporarily vacated, then dive in and add their own eggs to the nest.

THE HERDS is coming to London!

The Herds is a public art and climate initiative designed to inspire action and renew our bond with the natural world.

Until August 2025, life-size puppet animals from the makers of 'Little Amal' will sweep through city centres on a 12,500 mile journey from the Congo Basin to the Arctic Circle, fleeing climate disaster.



Events and performances by worldclass artists will respond as the herds move, bringing together the worlds of the arts and science in an urgent call for climate action.
