During the introit, the Cross and Gospels are brought in and the altar is censed.

OPENING HYMN

The deacon says

As we gather with the shepherds before the new born Christ-child, let us open our hearts in penitence and faith.

PRAYER OF RECONCILIATION

Ever-loving God, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed. We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. In your mercy forgive what we have been, help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be, that we may do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with you our God. Amen.

THE ABSOLUTION

The priest says

May the God of mercy and truth forgive you and set you free. May you take God's forgiveness to heart and be at peace. **Amen.**

THE GLORIA

The choir sings

Gloria In Excelsis

from the Spatzen-Messe by W.A. Mozart K.220 (1776)

LITURGY OF THE WORD The Collect

During this prayer, the final candle on the Advent Wreath is lit.

The priest says Let us pray. Eternal God, in the stillness of this night you sent your almighty Word to pierce the world's darkness with the light of salvation; give to the earth the peace that we long for and fill our hearts with the joy of heaven through Jesus Christ. Amen.

Please sit.

FIRST READING

Isaiah 52.7-10

How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation, who says to Zion, 'Your God reigns.' Listen! Your sentinels lift up their voices, together they sing for joy; for in plain sight they see the return of the Lord to Zion. Break forth together into singing, you ruins of Jerusalem; for the Lord has comforted his people, he has redeemed Jerusalem. The Lord has bared his holy arm before the eyes of all the nations; and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

Listen for what the Spirit is saying. Thanks be to God.

Please stand.

THE GOSPEL

John 1.1-14

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. **Glory to you O Lord.**

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you O Christ.**

THE NICENE CREED (from the 4th century)

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with Father and Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PEACE

The priest says

The angels sang 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to all in whom God takes delight!'.

The deacon says

The peace of the Lord be always with you. **And also with you.**

The priest says

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

The priest says

Word made flesh, life of the world, in your incarnation you embraced our poverty: by your Spirit may we share in your riches. **Amen.**

GATHERING

All are invited to gather round the altar. Should you need to sit, please use any of the benches or seats around the altar at the front of the church. While moving to the altar, we sing the Taizé chant ...

Jubilate Deo, jubilate Deo. Alleluia. (*Rejoice in God. Alleluia.*)

The priest leads the Church's Thanksgiving for Creation and Redemption in Christ ...

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

The priest continues the Church's prayer of thanksgiving ...

SANCTUS and BENEDICTUS

from the Spatzen-Messe by W.A. Mozart K.220 (1776)

The choir sings

Sanctus, Sanctus, Sanctus, Dominus Deus Sabaoth. Pleni sunt coeli et terra gloria tua. Osanna in excelsis.

Benedictus qui venit in nomine Domini. Osanna in excelsis.

Holy, holy, holy Lord God of Hosts. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is the one that comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The prayer of consecration continues recalling Christ's command to his disciples at the Last Supper, ending with: "... as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me"

The cantor sings

Great is the mystery of faith.

Sing after the cantor

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The prayer continues. At the end of the prayer, sing after the cantor . . .

Blessing and honour, glory and power, be yours forever and ever. Amen.

Silence is kept.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

You are invited to pray in your own language.

The priest says

Let us pray in the words that Jesus gave us.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

The Bread is broken and the priest says

We break the bread of life. And that life is the light of the world.

God here among us, light in the midst of us, bring us to light and life.

INVITATION TO COMMUNION

The priest says

This is the table of Christ. It has been made ready for those who love God, and those who want to love more. So come; you who have much faith and you who have little. You who have been to this sacrament often and you who have not been for some time. You who have tried to follow Christ and you who have failed. Come. It is Christ who asks us to meet him here.

THE COMMUNION

During Communion, the Lay Singers and Singing Scholars will sing *Silent Night* (words: Josef Mohr; music: Franz Gruber) and *Bethlehem Down* (words: Bruce Blunt; music: Peter Warlock).

A Prayer for Spiritual Communion

inspired by Richard of Chichester (1198-1253)

Thanks be to you, Christ Jesus, for all the benefits you have given me for all the pains and insults you have borne for me. Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I ask you to be present with me spiritually in my heart. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know you more clearly, love you more dearly, and follow you more nearly, day by day. Amen.

Prayers for use during Communion

Christ Jesus, you promised in your gospel 'I am with you always'. Be with me as part of this community today in this Eucharist; Hear my prayers for others and for myself. May I bind myself to you, in communion with all that lives this day, knowing that nothing can separate me from your love. Amen.

O God, help me to trust you, and to know that you are with me now. Help me to know that all are yours, and you are ours, in this Eucharist and for ever. Amen.

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

Eternal God, in this night you have made known to us again the coming of our Redeemer Jesus Christ; confirm our faith and fix our eyes on you, until the day dawns and Christ the Morning Star rises in our hearts. Amen.
