PRAYER OF RECONCILIATION

The deacon says

The risen Christ appeared to the disciples behind the doors they had locked out of fear. Let us make our confession to God, acknowledging all that separates us from Christ risen from the dead today.

Silence is kept.

Ever-loving God, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed. We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. In your mercy forgive what we have been, help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be, that we may do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with you our God. Amen.

THE ABSOLUTION

The priest says

May the God who is both power and love forgive you and free you from your sin; give you healing and strength, and raise you to new life in Christ. **Amen.**

LITURGY OF THE WORD The Collect

The priest says

Risen Christ, you filled your disciples with boldness and fresh hope: strengthen us to proclaim your risen life and fill us with your peace, to the glory of God. **Amen.**

FIRST READING Acts 3.12-19

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

When Peter saw it, he addressed the people, 'You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our ancestors has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and rejected in the presence of Pilate, though he had decided to release him. But you rejected the Holy and Righteous One and asked to have a murderer given to you, and you killed the Author of life, whom God raised from the dead. To this we are witnesses. And by faith in his name, his name itself has made this man strong, whom you see and know; and the faith that is through Jesus has given him this perfect health in the presence of all of you. 'And now, friends, I know that you acted in ignorance, as did also your rulers. In this way God fulfilled what he had foretold through all the prophets, that his Messiah would suffer. Repent therefore, and turn to God so that your sins may be wiped out.

Listen for what the Spirit is saying. Thanks be to God.

PSALM 4

Response: Answer me when I call, O my defender

You set me at liberty when I was in trouble; have mercy on me and hear my prayer. How long will you nobles dishonour my glory; how long will you love vain things and seek after falsehood?

But know that God does wonders for the faithful; when I call upon the Lord, God will hear me. Stand in awe, and sin not; speak to your heart in stillness upon your bed.

Offer the appointed sacrifices and put your trust in the Lord. There are many that say, 'Who will show us any good?' Lift the light of your countenance upon us.

You have put gladness in my heart, more than when grain, wine and oil increase. In peace I will lie down and sleep, for only you, Lord, make me dwell in safety.

THE GOSPEL Luke 24.36b-48

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. **Glory to you O Lord.**

While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.' They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, 'Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.' And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence.

Then he said to them, 'These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you-that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you O Christ.**

SERMON

The Revd Daniel Norris

APOSTLES' CREED (3rd century creed used during Eastertide)

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

The cantor sings Great is the mystery of faith.

All sing after the cantor

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The prayer continues at the end of the prayer, sing after the cantor

Blessing and honour, glory and power, be yours for ever and ever. Amen. Silence is kept.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

You are invited to pray in your own language.

The priest says Let us pray in the words that Jesus gave us.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

The Bread is broken and the priest says

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ. Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

INVITATION TO COMMUNION

The priest says

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you, and his blood which he shed for you. Eat and drink in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Communion will be distributed form three stations at the front of the church.

A Snowfall of Words

Reflections on the soul language of poetry with poet Diane Pacitti and The Very Revd Dr Mark Oakley, Dean of Southwark. Wednesday 17th April at 6.30 pm

What is the point of poetry in such a precarious world, at a time when so much we value is being threatened?

Is poetry something difficult that most people leave others to enjoy, or is it something more vital and urgent, a 'soul language' for a time when religious language often doesn't resonate?



Our speakers will approach these questions through the experience of particular poems. Mark Oakley's books include *The Splash of Words: Believing in Poetry* described by the former Poet Laureate Carol Ann Duffy as 'this beautiful and wise meditation centred around the soul language of poetry'.



Diane Pacitti's recent poems seek to deepen our vision of reality through a precise response to the natural world. Collaborating with a scientist and an artist, she writes for Earth Justice projects at St James's Piccadilly. After gaining the Brontë Poetry Prize, she produced the collection **Dark Angelic Mills** during a Poetry Residency in Bradford.

Walking Boots - South Downs 4: Seaford to Berwick via Seven Sisters

Saturday 27th April 8.45am

Our April walk sees us returning to the South Downs to blow away the cobwebs over an extremely scenic 10-mile route guided by Nick. We'll be heading further eastwards along Sussex's white chalk cliff tops to Seven Sisters and the stunning river mouth views at Cuckmere Haven.

From there we will traverse wooded trails to Littlington where we'll stop at the traditional and welcoming Plough & Harrow Pub for lunch. Afterwards we will ease back into our walk along the riverbank before heading cross country towards Berwick, passing through Alfriston, one of Sussex's prettiest villages, on route.



Some parts of this route are steep if you're not used to hill walking. We'll take things steadily but please consider this before joining us.

The ground is rugged and can be slippery in parts so please wear sturdy footwear and bring sufficient water and snacks.
