
## Rooted in God's Earth: Trees in Scripture

When the poor and needy seek water, and there is none,

and their tongue is parched with thirst, I the LORD will answer them,

I the God of Israel will not forsake them. <sup>18</sup> I will open rivers on the bare heights, and fountains in the midst of the valleys; I will make the wilderness a pool of water, and the dry land springs of water.

<sup>19</sup> I will put in the wilderness the cedar, the acacia, the myrtle, and the olive; I will set in the desert the cypress, the plane and the pine together, <sup>20</sup> so that all may see and know, all may consider and understand, that the hand of the LORD has done this, the Holy One of Israel has created it.
