INTROIT

During the Introit, the Cross and Gospels are brought in and the altar is censed.

OPENING HYMN

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by. Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light; the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

O morning stars, together proclaim the holy birth, and praises sing to God the King, and peace to all the earth. For Christ is born of Mary; and, gathered all above, while mortals sleep, the angels keep their watch of wond'ring love.

How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is giv'n! So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heav'n. No ear may hear his coming; but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him, still the dear Christ enters in.

O holy child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray; cast out our sin, and enter in, be born in us today. We hear the Christmas angels the great glad tidings tell: O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel.

OPENING RESPONSES

The priest says

Grace, mercy and peace from God and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

And also with you.

A hallowed day has dawned upon us. Let us pray in wonder and awe. **For a great light has shone on the earth!**

The priest welcomes everyone and introduces the service.

Eternal God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The deacon says

As we gather with the shepherds before the new born Christ-child, let us open our own hearts in penitence and faith.

PRAYER OF RECONCILIATION

Ever-loving God, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed. We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. In your mercy forgive what we have been, help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be, that we may do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with you our God. Amen.

THE ABSOLUTION

The priest says

May the God of mercy and truth forgive you and set you free. May you take God's forgiveness to heart and be at peace. **Amen.**

THE GLORIA Shout For Joy (Personent Hodie)

All sing

Shout for joy, loud and long, God be praised with a song! To our God we belong– Children of our maker, God the great life giver!

Refrain: Shout for joy, joy, joy! Shout for joy, joy, joy! God is love. God is light. God is everlasting! By God's word all was made; Heav'n and earth, light and shade, Nature's wonders displayed. We to tend creation From its first foundation.

So we stand with our song! We will work all as one For the kingdom we long: We will sing together, With our God for ever!

LITURGY OF THE WORD The Collect

The priest says

Let us pray.

Jesus Christ, your birth at Bethlehem draws us to kneel in wonder at heaven touching earth; accept our heartfelt praise as we worship you, our Redeemer and our eternal God. **Amen.**

Please sit.

FIRST READING

Titus 3.4-7

A reading from the Letter of Paul to Titus

But when the goodness and loving-kindness of God our Saviour appeared, he saved us, not because of any works of righteousness that we had done, but according to his mercy, through the water of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit. This Spirit he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Saviour, so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

Listen for what the Spirit is saying. Thanks be to God.

While Shepherds watched their flocks by night, all seated on the ground, the angel of the Lord came down, and glory shone around.

'Fear not,' said he (for mighty dread had seized their troubled mind); glad tidings of great joy I bring to you and humankind.

'To you in David's town this day is born of David's line a Saviour who is Christ the Lord; and this shall be the sign:

'The heavenly babe you there shall find to human view displayed, all meanly wrapped in swathing bands, and in a manger laid.' Thus spake the Seraph; and forthwith appeared a shining throng of angels praising God, who thus addressed their joyful song:

'All glory be to God on high, and on the earth be peace; good-will henceforth from heaven to earth begin and never cease.'

THE GOSPEL

Luke 2.1-20

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. **Glory to you O Lord.**

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see–I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven,

and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you O Christ.**

THE NICENE CREED (4th century)

We believe in one God. the Father, the Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with Father and Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The priest says

Christ is born, the Prince of Peace. Let us rejoice and be glad.

The peace of the Lord be always with you. And also with you.

The priest says

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan, earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone; snow had fallen, snow on snow, snow on snow, in the bleak midwinter, long ago.

And our eyes at last shall see him through his own redeeming love, for that child so dear and gentle is our Lord in heav'n above; and he leads his children on to the place where he is gone.

Not in that poor lowly stable, with the oxen standing by, we shall see him; but in heaven, set at God's right hand on high; there his children gather round bright like stars, in glory crowned.

THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

The priest leads the Church's Thanksgiving for Creation and Redemption in Christ ...

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lift up your hearts. **We lift them to the Lord.**

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

The priest continues the Church's prayer of thanksgiving...

SANCTUS and BENEDICTUS (Williams)

Sing each phrase after the cantor

Holy, holy, holy Lord God of power and might. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna, Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest.

The cantor sings

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.

Sing after the cantor

Hosanna, Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest.

The prayer of consecration continues recalling Christ's command to his disciples at the Last Supper, ending with: "...as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me" The cantor sings Great is the mystery of faith.

Sing after the cantor

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The prayer continues. At the end of the prayer, sing after the cantor...

Blessing and honour, glory and power, be yours forever and ever. Amen.

Silence is kept.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

You are invited to pray in your own language.

The priest says

Let us pray in the words that Jesus gave us.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

The Bread is broken and the priest says

We break the bread of life. And that life is the light of the world.

God here among us, light in the midst of us, bring us to light and life.

INVITATION TO COMMUNION

The priest says

This is the table of Christ. It has been made ready for those who love God, and those who want to love more. So come; you who have much faith and you who have little. You who have been to this sacrament often and you who have not been for some time. You who have tried to follow Christ and you who have failed. Come. It is Christ who asks us to meet him here.

THE COMMUNION

During Communion the Lay Singers and Scholars will sing *Nativity Carol,* words and music: John Rutter (b. 1945) and *Gaudete* (words and music: Anon. 15th/16th century).

A Prayer for Spiritual Communion inspired by Richard of Chichester (1198-1253)

Thanks be to you, Christ Jesus, for all the benefits you have given me for all the pains and insults you have borne for me. Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I ask you to be present with me spiritually in my heart. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know you more clearly, love you more dearly, and follow you more nearly, day by day. Amen.

Prayers for use during Communion

Christ Jesus, you promised in your gospel 'I am with you always'. Be with me as part of this community today in this Eucharist; Hear my prayers for others and for myself. May I bind myself to you, in communion with all that lives this day, knowing that nothing can separate me from your love. Amen.

O God, help me to trust you, and to know that you are with me now. Help me to know that all are yours, and you are ours, in this Eucharist and for ever. Amen.

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

Eternal God, whose Word has come among us in bread and wine and in the Holy Child of Bethlehem: may the light of faith shine in our lives through the one who is Christ our Saviour. Amen.
