FIRST READING Acts 12.1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover.

While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him. The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains

fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, "Fasten your belt and put on your sandals." He did so. Then he said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. Then Peter came to himself and said, "Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting."

Listen for what the Spirit is saying.

Dear family-blood, chosen, spiritual, and trans women in particular-thank you for being an inspiration in my life. Thank you for showing up as yourselves and showing me how to do the same. Thank you for illuminating my flaws, and the flaws of humanity. Thank you for always leading with Spirit.

Before my mother and I became estranged because of my queerness, she used to tell me that I was "fearfully and wonderfully made," that "no weapon formed against me shall prosper," and that "God loves me and knows my heart." I believed her. I still believe her, despite our differences. I believe the Word. No form of hatred can take this love away. No lawmaker, no politician, no force can challenge the love of universal knowing."

Friday 27th - Sunday 29th June

The Herds is a public art and climate initiative designed to inspire action and renew our bond with the natural world.



Until August 2025, life-size puppet animals from the makers of 'Little Amal' will sweep through city centres on a 12,500 mile journey from the Congo Basin to the Arctic Circle, fleeing climate disaster.

Events and performances by world-class artists will respond as the herds move, bringing together the worlds of the arts and science in an urgent call for climate action.



Whilst in London, The Herds will visit Tower Bridge, Somerset House, St James's Park, Coram's Fields, Camden High Street, Westfield Stratford City, and Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park.

Fearfully and Wonderfully Made (The Essence of Joy) Artwork by Ariel Collier in the Side Chapel

For Pride this year, St James's will exhibit new work by the artist Ariel Collier (she/they/we/our) in the Side Chapel.

Collier is a London based conceptual artist, writer, researcher and curator originally from South Florida.

Titled Fearfully and Wonderfully Made (The Essence of Joy), the work references Psalm 139. Collier writes: 'Western portrayals of trans women often rely on narrow images. This piece re-orientates, towards the domestic and intimate—just as God sees the heart.



My friend, radiant inside and out, reintroduced me to the House of God and continues to nourish my spirit from near and far.'

Collier's work challenges alienation, estrangement and polarisation using multiple mediums and collective organizing to shift global understandings of black queer culture towards our inner worlds, reflections and interconnections.

Collier is also the founder of Home Studio, a nomadic space dedicated to the promotion, empowerment and development of queer and trans global majority artists by hosting workshops, making sessions and exhibitions.
